Dravecky inspires at Narberth church

NARBERTH — When former major league baseball player and cancer survivor Dave Dravecky spoke at Narberth Presbyterian Church earlier this month on the topic of "The Worth of a Man," the talk proved entertaining and thought-provoking.

Dravecky, an amputee who lost his arm to cancer, stood in front of the audience of about 500 people without the arm that made him famous, and delivered a lighthearted yet serious message.

Despite suffering a crushing blow to his baseball livelihood, Dravecky has since taken up golf, motorcycling, fishing and

"It was hard hitting a golf ball with one arm," said Dravecky. "And I'm sure for some of you it's hard enough with two, let alone one."

He later added, "I believe laughter is healing to the soul."

At one point, Dravecky said, "My aunt Shirley's a nun. I'll never forget the comment that she made to my mother when she heard that I was traded from Pittsburgh to San Diego. She said 'Donna, would you please tell David that I believe it was divine intervention that he went from being a Pirate to a Padre.'"

Dravecky mixed his talk with humor and seriousness, just as he used to mix up his pitches.

"It's not what you do that matters most, it's who you are," said the former major-league pitcher.

Dravecky talked of skiing down a mountain close to his present home in Colorado and overhearing someone giving the instructions, "Left...right" to his blind friend to help him ski down the slone.

Dravecky added, "I am more whole today than I have ever been," and closed with a poem and the statement, "Cancer has been a blessing in Dave Dravecky's life."

The event was preceded by a tailgate party in the church's gym with free hot dogs and other ball-park-style food.
